Hunton Hill Water Main Replacement Update

South East Water presented their updated plans for the Hunton Hill water main replacement at the parish council meeting in March. The current proposals are for work to start on 18th June for 11 weeks, finishing on 3rd September, with Hunton Hill being closed between Amsbury Road and East Street for nine weeks after which traffic lights will be in place on the East Street / West Street junction for two weeks. Lughorse Lane will be closed whilst the traffic lights are in place. The diversion route that has been agreed with Kent Highways is along the B2163 Heath Road and Ewell Lane through West Farleigh to the Tickled Trout, then the B2010 Smiths Hill and Yalding Hill into Yalding and back along Vicarage Road into West Street (and vice versa).

The meeting was well attended by local residents and businesses and, whilst the need for the project is understood, there were questions over whether everything possible was being considered to minimise the length of the road closure, including extending working hours and laying part of the main on adjacent farmland. Jeremy Dufour, the project manager from South East Water, said that they were planning to work five days a week but could look into working longer days. However, the option of running some of the pipe work on Amsbury Farm had been rejected for a number of reasons, including the presence of protected species, which would require special permission from Natural England. It was suggested that it might be possible to get a permit from Natural England to allow the work to go ahead and Mr Dufour confirmed that South East Water had not looked into this option.

There was concern that the diversion route would be chaotic and dangerous with HGVs travelling in both directions and with the additional disruption of the recently commenced construction works in Vicarage Road. Residents were also worried about the impact on the smaller lanes locally as drivers looked for shorter alternatives to the official diversion.

At the request of the parish council a meeting has been arranged for the end of April between South East Water's environmental team (who made the decision that the pipe couldn't be laid on the farmland), Kent Highways, the parish council, Amsbury Farm and a residents' representative to see if it's possible to come up with a less disruptive solution. Will keep you posted...

Pastoral Letter

What do Cher, James Stewart, Betty Driver, Benjamin Guinness and Joe Cocker have in common? They all have/had May birthdays. I wonder how many of our readers can add their name to the list who also share birthdays in May?

Birthdays are special occasions which we like to celebrate. Each of us I am sure has our own traditions of celebrating. In my family the person whose birthday it is chooses where they want to eat and then the family gather together to celebrate with them.

On 20th May there is a special birthday, but unlike other birthdays it is not always on the same date each year. Have you guessed which birthday I am talking about? This year on 20th May is Pentecost, what is known as the birthday of the Church. Like all birthdays it is marked with presents and celebrations. Appalachian Adventure

Hunton resident, Megan Dolman is thru-hiking the Appalachian Trail – all 2,190 miles of it! Last month we followed Megan through the first 100 miles of her epic trek from Georgia into North Carolina. From mile 167 she began a six-day, 72-mile hike through “**The Sucky and Miserable Smoky Mountains**”, a week that Megan politely describes as “rubbish”. She endured freezing temperatures, deep snow, ice and slush, 30mph winds and driving rain, as well as struggling with a painful knee, and spent the majority of the time “feeling cold to the core, in damp clothing, with prunes for feet that squelched with every step encased in soaking wet shoes.” She was not even rewarded with what should have been stunning views from some of the highest peaks on the trail, as on reaching the summit they were invariably shrouded in thick fog. We won't dwell too much on what was clearly a mentally and physically draining time (although the full, miserable details can be found in her blog if you'd like to know more) but are happy to report that the weather has improved dramatically since leaving the “Smokies” and her knee has completely recovered. Continuing along the North Carolina/Tennessee border, by 10th April (just over a month on the trail) she had 400 miles under her belt and was looking forward to reaching the 4th state, Virginia, at mile 466, and to being reunited with her mother, Lisa, for two weeks.

Pond Warden 'Blog'

As well as being Tree Warden, I also have a voluntary role looking after the ponds in the parish, and have been mapping their drainage routes (or 'no drainage' in some cases) over the past years, with me having been a drainage/water engineer before becoming more of a soil contamination expert. We have some interesting small ponds fed by spring waters from the Greensand Ridge, but sadly some overgrown old ones that seem to have been old local gravel pits on farms. All contain a fair sprinkling of amphibians and invertebrates, along with many different plant species (and a lot of fallen trees in the 'unloved' ones). Recently, I've been on a Pond Wardening course (at Singleton Environment Centre in Ashford, which has its own pond, community woodland, and very nice café for Sunday lunch!) and have lots of information about sizing, locating and building a pond, if you are thinking of doing so. There are half a million ponds in the UK, of which 75,000 are in Norfolk (!), but only one county in England has active Pond Wardening, so we're looking to help keep Kent ponds going (where neglected), growing/increasing in diversity, and also free of invasive weeds or plants. And if you want to see some local ponds and marsh habitats (and bats & owls), Yalding Fen is a great place to start, over the canal bridge just behind the Anchor and Teapot Island.

Spring Music Events – Hannah Scott and Track Dogs

We have two musical evenings for you at the village hall in May and early June, both with bands that have played before and asked to come back, and both have new CDs to regale you with. First up on **Saturday 19th May** are **Hannah Scott and Stefano della Casa**, who played for us back in late 2015; Hannah on guitar & piano, Stefano on cello; the new album is 'Signs of Life' – very atmospheric music, which complements our hall acoustics. As last time, we will also have an opening set from **Kirsty Macleod**, a local (Thurnham) singer-songwriter who's played at the Hazlitt twice this year and other local venues.

Two weeks later, on **Saturday 2nd June**, we have the return of the Irish-American-Sheffield trumpet-led chaps from Madrid, **Track Dogs**; they last played here in July 2016 and did an initial set outdoors. Weather permitting, we'll try the same thing this time, and suggest people bring their own picnic food for this. We've recently seen Track Dogs at Cobham Church (twice!), and they also played a stage in Trafalgar Square on St Patrick's Day this year (in overcoats). Their new CD, Kansas City Out-Groove, has shades of spaghetti western soundtracks in places, is most enjoyable and has already been played in the village club.
