Hunton Wanderers CC End of Season Report

Hunton Wanderers CC fields three regular league sides, two on Saturday in the Kent Regional Cricket League (Divisions 1A Central and 1C Central/East respectively) and one on Sunday in the Kent Village Cricket League, Division 3. We also play occasional friendlies and T20 games, participate in the Maidstone District Indoor League during the winter months and hold winter indoor nets at the Grammar School.

I am pleased to report that we fulfilled the majority of our fixtures in the 2018 season, although we did concede a couple on Saturday and one on Sunday due to lack of numbers. This is a theme running through Kent recreational cricket at the moment; indeed during the season several clubs withdrew from the Saturday Leagues, five withdrew from the KVCL on Sunday and several local clubs have folded completely.

The problem seems to be keeping youngsters engaged during their teenage years - so many clubs with good youth set ups find it difficult to retain young players past their 16th year. They just seem to lose interest - or maybe they simply find other, more exciting alternatives! As the older club members fade into the twilight zone of umpiring and scoring, there are simply not enough youngsters to replace them any more.

Back to Hunton cricket and, blessed with a long, hot summer we lost only two games to bad weather although the lack of rain took its toll on the cricket square by the end of the season.

On the pitch, our three teams battled valiantly and all retained their positions in their respective divisions. The Saturday 1st XI

struggled to get runs all season but avoided relegation with victories over Leybourne, New Ash Green, Southfleet and the Mote 3rd XI. The 2nd XI, amazingly, did not finish bottom of their division this year, winning four fixtures; and the Sunday XI finished well above the relegation places, although we lost the games we expected to win, and had unexpected victories against strong opposition, the highlight being a win against High Halstow early in the season.

We hope that 2019 starts with the same level of enthusiasm as this season, when we were frequently oversubscribed for Saturday games. However, we will always welcome new players, regardless of age, background or ability. Please come and join us to enjoy truly friendly, recreational sport in beautiful village locations. Your Last Chance to save our Herald!

In July 2018 we reported that the current Editor, Helen Ward, would be stepping down in April 2019 after five years in the role. We asked for volunteers to take over but were met with a deafening silence! In September 2018 we asked again but again there were no volunteers.

The Herald has been delivered free to every house in the village for 16 years. It circulates village news and forthcoming events and raises money for village causes (£20,000 has been raised and £15,000 given to about 10 village fund raising groups).

Accepting that having been blessed with three editors (averaging a little over 5 years each) there is now no one willing to take on the role, we have tried to find a way of keeping The Herald going and, as a last effort to save this village asset, are suggesting putting a team together with a shared responsibility.

So what is involved? A key challenge is to ensure that there are enough articles each month and that key village events are both advertised in advance and reported on after they have occurred. This generally requires emailing round to encourage others to put pen to paper and some editing of anything offered. The only computer skill required is a basic knowledge of MS Word. There is no need to worry about layout as another member of the Herald team manages this.

We understand that a regular monthly commitment is off-putting and so we are looking to put together enough volunteers to allow sub teams of 2-3 to share the role each month, with each individual doing as much or as little as they are able to do. On a monthly basis, this might allow one to edit/write, another to proof read and another to email round, pulling in articles, or all roles could be shared.

So far we have a few volunteers but need more to make this approach work. Please email me, James Forster, at forsters.hunton@btinternet.com if you can help, stating what aspects of the role you are happy to take on and what (if anything) you would prefer not to have to do so we can try to suggest teams that could work together. Alternatively if you want to suggest your own teams that would be even better! Please say how many issues you would be able to help with but ideally I would like a big enough team to ensure each group covers up to a couple of months through the year.

As Helen said in an earlier article, "It's a great way of getting to know everyone and everything in the village" so if you have recently moved in, or want to expand your involvement in village life, it offers a fantastic way of doing so!

While Helen has been Editor of the Herald she has developed the Hunton Facebook page as a real-time news feed for the village - this role also needs to be filled if it is to continue.

Greensand Ridge AONB

The following article was published in the December Linton newsletter, but is equally relevant to us here in Hunton:

One of the most special things about Linton is its far-reaching views, out across the Weald and beyond. Historically, these views have been protected by Maidstone Borough Council under local designations such as "Special Landscape Area" etc. Unfortunately, as the recent major industrial development in Redwall Lane has demonstrated, these "protections" have no statutory or legal base and even though they are enshrined in the Maidstone Local Plan, they can therefore be ignored by developers and planners alike, with impunity. Our views are therefore being steadily eroded, and we need to do more before they disappear entirely.

For a number of years, Linton Parish Council has been asking for statutory protection through the creation of a new Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). This imposes strict rules on what is and is not permitted, and gives them full legal backing that cannot be conveniently ignored. The recently announced Governmental Review of national parks and AONBs has given some impetus to our suggestion which has now been taken up by the Borough Council and hopefully will be progressed. Linton Parish Council supports this initiative as part of our Environmental Policy and you can help!

Every time you speak to a Borough Councillor, County Councillor or MP, tell them that the Greensand Ridge should not be treated as a building site and must be protected for our children and the future. Ask them what they are doing to support and encourage this proposal, and vote accordingly! Our rural location is precious but is also fragile.

These matters take a long time to go through, but if we are firm and clear in what we need, we will get there in the end. More on the Linton Website: http://lintonkent.org/planning.
