Pastoral Letter

During my work as an Organisation Development Consultant prior to responding to the call to ordination, I used a number of tools and techniques to help teams and individuals to gain insight into their behaviour and attitudes so that they could maximise efficiency. One of my favourites was (and is) the Myers Briggs Type Indicator® This 88-question psychometric instrument gave insight into preferences - about how we are energised, how we make decisions etc and gives a four-letter code as a "Preference Type" such as INFP or ESTJ. You may have done this yourself at some point. There are several online equivalents available if interested. The point is that this gave just one insight (albeit a very well researched and accurate one) into a complex personality – yet people used it as a defining tag, saying "I am an ENFJ" for example. This is a complete misunderstanding and misuse of such a tool, and leads to many incorrect understandings and labelling of the other. The preference type does not define an individual, it merely shines a light on to one part of their nature. In the same way, I have been horrified to hear the labelling of "Remainers" or "Leavers" (or even worse "Remoaners" and "Brexiteers") with respect to our views on membership of the European Union. I voted remain, but that doesn't make me a "Remainer", and certainly not a "Remoaner" - it makes me somebody who voted remain. Life is nuanced, and we seem to have lost the ability in a divided world to accept that, to see the bigger picture, to hold back on judging a person on one aspect of who they are, in their personality or their politics. I long for a kinder, gentler, more enquiring dialogue in which we respect the other's perspective and don't label them.

There is one thing that is different for me – when it comes to my faith. I do wish to be identified, to be defined by, my Christianity. It is the foundational, most important aspect of who I am. Indeed of who we are as a worshipping community who follow the teachings of Jesus Christ. To be a Christian should define everything about us, and shape everything we do. As St. Paul wrote to the church in Philippi: "Our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ". As we await his return, I pray that we would find a way to heal division and unite our country to the benefit of all.

Sue Heaton's Gardening Jobs for June – Six Key Tasks

- 1. Keep up with the dead heading to encourage more flowers. Roses in particular respond to this treatment.
- 2. If you have not already done so, stake tall floppy plants as they grow before they get knocked about by wind or rain storms.
- 3. Plant annuals to fill in the gaps in the borders and don't forget any autumn flowering bulbs you might want to plant.
- 4. Take soft wood cuttings from perennials, such as Penstemon and deciduous shrubs such as Lavender.
- 5. Shrubs that have flowered in the spring can now be pruned back.
- 6. It is time to get the protected plants outside as the worst of the weather should be behind us, but make sure they are hardened off first.

Jack, who went to Africa with his dad Dominic for the Butale project, writes:

On my first day in Butale in Ethiopia, I met Aloysious who I have been writing to for three years since we

started sponsoring him to go to school. It was very hard because when I met him he was very ill. He was lying on the floor in his old house suffering with malaria. He was very weak and not able to talk. Thanks to the sponsorship and the team out in Uganda we were able to help by taking him by truck to the local clinic for assessment and treatment. During the week I was there he got stronger and by the end we were able to spend lots of time together playing ball games and with some story dice that I had sent him in a parcel last year.



I was so keen to get to the school on Monday and meet the rest of the pupils. When they saw us they were very excited, asking questions, dancing and singing songs to us, it was very moving. One of the highlights of the trip was helping to fit and give new shoes to all the children; another was playing football at playtime with the local boys.

The project raised £2,700 and every single penny was spent on projects when we were in the community. Projects like helping construct a new home for Aloysious as his current home was dangerous to live in. We managed to finish it before we left. Overall it was an incredible trip and I will never forget it. Very many thanks to everybody who donated.
