# **Huntonwatch Alert**

You may already be aware via Facebook,or indeed through Huntonwatch, that the village has been targeted over the last 6-8 weeks by thieves who are breaking into isolated outbuildings. A number of mowers and strimmers have been stolen and ten incidents have been reported. This is not limited to Hunton and during the night of  $14^{th}/15^{th}$  July there were at least NINE such events in the immediate area which police are now investigating. It is clear that these are not isolated opportunistic crimes which means that people have been scouting the area looking for targets.

We ask that you keep a note of any vans, cars, people that you see wandering around the village with no apparent good reason for doing so (trust your instincts - if it doesn't look or feel right then it quite probably isn't). Please report anything you see to the police (via 101) and us at huntonwatch@gmail.com 820403.

We also strongly recommend that you consider doing some or all of the following:

- If you have valuable equipment in outbuildings then lock the buildings with a high security lock (graded 8 or higher).
- Alarm vulnerable buildings battery operated shed alarms are freely available.
- Lock any gates that you can as a matter of routine it makes just one more thing the thieves have to overcome.
- Take photos of your valuables and keep the photos in a safe place this may help with them being returned to you if they are stolen.
- Chain your mowers etc to the fabric of the outbuilding, or to each other using a high security chain and padlock (once again means one more obstacle for the thieves to overcome).
- Install covert wildlife camera traps in strategic positions these are not expensive to buy and are triggered by movement. They may provide valuable evidence.
- Park cars close to garage doors if your valuables are stored there so that even if the door locks are forced the doors cannot be opened sufficiently to allow mowers etc to be taken out.
- Don't make obvious changes when you are away on holiday and alter your daily routine so as not to make it too predictable when the house is empty.
- Display neighbourhood watch signs on and around your property (we can supply window stickers).

You may not feel that some or all of these would work for you but everything you can do to make the thieves' job harder, longer and thus riskier might just deter them.

#### **Pastoral Letter**

Nostalgia ain't what it used to be. Memory is a funny thing isn't it? The more mature reader will have many memories to draw upon, whilst younger readers are still making them (not that we ever stop). As we grow older, time seems to pass more quickly, and this is a function of memory. Significant events are more easily remembered as we live our lives, and the older we are, the fewer events are significant. Been there, done that, got the t-shirt. So, the gap between them is longer, and time seems to fly.

I am fascinated by dreams, and have read a bit about them in my time. The article that made most sense to me described how during deep sleep we process the day's events (sometimes a few days) and decide where in our internal filing system (aka brain) we are going to store memories so that they can be easily retrieved. We open up neural pathways to relevant events (e.g. events involving driving, or food) and if we change from deep sleep to a more conscious state (caused by a noise or a call of nature for example), we recall the dream as if it were real. Most often, they make little sense because we are remembering a previous time when we were eating a particular food, or driving a particular journey. The latest research shows that we actually split the memories and store parts of them in different parts of the brain. Because of that, and the challenge in recalling and reassembling our memories, we are often nostalgic for times that never actually existed!

On the night before he died, Jesus was celebrating the Passover with his disciples (at the Last Supper) and he blessed the bread and the wine, giving thanks to God, and told his disciples to eat and drink in remembrance of his death on the cross. He used a powerful visual prompt which Christians re-enact week by week as we gather around the Lord's table and share in Holy Communion. It is good to remember all that Jesus has done for us, and to celebrate his memory regularly. If you would like to know more about Holy Communion, or wish to explore Confirmation, when as adults we affirm the Baptismal promise made on our behalf and begin to take Communion, please do get in touch.

## **Hunton WI are Inspired by Herbs**

In July, Lin Sains talked to the group about Inspirational Herbs. Lin has been growing herbs for 50 years and her expertise has led to her being the advisor at Rye Castle Museum's Medieval Garden and author of 'The Garden beyond the Tower'. At Rye, she has a courtyard garden with several very rare plants and the Still Room is set up as a Herbalist's Studio. She has also worked with English Heritage helping them to identify plants and herbs in Old Master paintings.

She gave a brief history of herbs which have been used in medicine, cooking and decoration since Medieval times and probably longer. The definition of a herb is any plant (from tiny creepers to mature trees) that are 'of use and benefit to man'. Although often thought of as ancient remedies, new uses are still being found: probably best known is the anti cancer drug, Tamoxifen, from the Yew tree and snow drops are currently being tested as an Alzheimer's treatment.

Lin then gave the ladies some tempting ideas for using herbs in their own cooking, from marinades for meat to nettle quiche, trout and samphire pate and violas or primroses in Spring salads. Flavoured oils and vinegars also make lovely, personalised gifts at Christmas, not to mention sloe or bullace gin/sherry!

Lin gave an insight into how to make the most of dishes that we tend to take for granted – there is more to herbs than a sprig of rosemary on roast lamb!

## **Brian Mortimer**

It was with much sadness that Hunton learned of the death on the 24th May of a great friend and supporter of the Village Brian Mortimer.

Brian had suffered from cancer for a number of years but throughout that time retained his trademark cheerfulness and positive demeanour. He was our representative on the Maidstone Borough Council and it was very rare for him to miss a Parish Council meeting even when his illness and treatment could have kept him away.

Past and present members of Hunton Parish Council, and all those Parishioners who attended meetings, will remember Brian's openness and helpful attitude no matter how minor the issue might have been. His knowledge and experience of Maidstone Borough Council planning, and other matters, was extensive and available to all. A Liberal Democrat, he remained A-Political when dealing with anyone.

He did not only support Hunton through his Borough Council role, he was also the lead guitarist and vocalist in a band who twice supported The Friends of St.Mary's supper dance. The band was a great success made up of Brian's friends and all local. They made no charge at all so that all our proceeds could go straight to the Charity. The second time the band performed was after Brian had endured a particularly tough Chemo session. We all expected him to cancel, but not Brian who played and sang just as well as he had ever done. Quite remarkable. Those of you who attended will remember him, his band and the evenings so well. Hunton will be the poorer without him.
