# **Hunton Fete & Christmas Fair**

The above events take a massive amount of planning and after 9 highly successful years we feel that it is time for a new committee. Consequently, the current committee has decided to stand down with immediate effect. It is hoped that others in the village will accept responsibility for organising these popular community events. We can now share the 2019 Fete's financial details but it must be noted that these are interim accounts as final numbers from some stallholders are still awaited.

# Summer Fete

The committee's aim was to host a traditional, English summer fete. Various village organisations and charities such as Friends of St Mary's, Kent Air Ambulance, Bloodwise and Hunton's various clubs etc. were allotted stalls free of charge. This was to raise money for their causes. The fete was not, per se, a fundraising event. It was resurrected because of a generous loan of £1000 from the Parish Council. This was repaid immediately following that first fete and since then the event has been self-funding. A contingency was maintained to ensure that the fete could be paid for each year including a reserve to cover losses had it been necessary to cancel. This model latterly included reserving sufficient funds (£6000) to also underwrite the Christmas Fair for which the committee took responsibility in late 2017.

After meeting these commitments excess money was used to purchase items for general village & community use, including 12 gazebos, smart TV for the club, tablecloths, 6 gallows signs and holders for advertising events, 2 heated soup tureens, a tea urn, 3 cake stands, the vintage cart used at events, 100m of external village hall lighting and several other small items e.g. artificial Christmas trees for the church, a snow machine, Santa's costume (available for rental) and Christmas fairy lights etc. The next proposed spend was to meet the shortfall in the insurance payouts on the theft of the orchard and church mowers. At 31st July the cost of putting on the fete stood at £1,530.53. Takings totalled £2,101.56 resulting in a profit for the events fund of £571.03.

# **Christmas Fair**

This event has its roots in the highly successful antiques market, held in the church and churchyard for several years. Unlike the summer fete this was designed to be fund-raising with the 2 main beneficiaries - St Marys Church and Friends of St Marys. As with the summer fete, village organisations and charities could apply for a stall, free of charge, to raise funds for their own causes. When the committee became involved in 2017 the decision was taken to broaden the appeal by including a child-orientated element based in the village hall with the aim of this becoming self-funding assisted by the sale of teas, coffee and mulled wine. This proved successful.

#### Pastoral Letter

Every generation a major festival takes place in Vevey, Switzerland. Running from 1797, the last two occasions being 1977 and 1999, the twelfth "Fête des Vignerons" – the festival of the wine growers – has just come to an end. After 3 weeks of daily shows comprising 5,500 volunteer actors and performers who have rehearsed for a year, there were hugs, tears, smiles and cheers. Alongside the daily parade of characters, merchandise, food and performances in the lakeside stages, the spectacular main event was indeed significant. Those privileged to see it (20,000 at a time in a temporary arena built on the market car park!) will long remember it. Significant events stay in our memories and shape our experiences.

In my previous employment I worked with people to explore significant events in their lives, from childhood through to the present, looking for patterns and themes that helped individuals discover more about themselves and the things they are good at. Often, we would find repeating patterns of things that were both enjoyable and successful which helped career choices and decisions about the future.

Significant events in our lives include births, marriages, deaths, house moves, job changes and so on. When Jesus called the first disciples, this was the most significant thing that had ever happened to them (see Matthew chapter 4, Mark chapter 1, Luke chapter 4). They left everything and followed him into a ministry that changed the world forever. Many of us are called into a relationship that will change our lives forever, and our response to that call can be the most significant decision we have ever taken. Later this month on September 28th Lorna Faulkner will be ordained at Rochester Cathedral as she enters into the next phase of her calling and vocation. The following day we will be celebrating with her at St. Mary's Hunton as she is commissioned as the Assistant Curate in our benefice. Her father will preach and we will gather in the village hall afterwards for a fellowship lunch (more details about the lunch will be shared in churches soon).

When we say yes to Jesus we take our place in the body of Christ that is the church and we each play our part according to our talents, gifts and abilities. As we celebrate with Lorna we will remember that the most important activities in the church are the unseen acts of service and love. At the end of the Fête des Vignerons the largest cheer was for those who followed the cows with shovel and wheelbarrow. Quite right too!

### King George V Playing Field Management Committee

For those of you that are unfamiliar with its role, the Management Committee looks after the recreation field next to the Village Hall on behalf of the Parish Council. It is made up of Trustees from each of the Sports Clubs and the Parish Council. Our aim is to maintain the facilities of the field, not only for the benefit of the clubs but also the general public. We are responsible for arranging grass cutting, trimming and pruning of the field hedges, litter bin emptying, the upkeep of the play equipment and car park, general maintenance and tidiness.

Each year we try to set an objective that we believe will enhance or improve the field. Recent additions have included new car park fencing, new field and pedestrian gates, a new nest swing in the play area and new safety surfacing around the multiplay unit. This year safety fencing was installed around the play equipment for younger children so that parents do not need to worry about their little ones running off and to keep dogs out. If anyone has any suggestions as to how the facilities may be further improved we will be delighted to hear from you.

We are all aware of the increase in rural crime and the playing field has been a victim of this on a number of occasions recently. Both the Bowls Club and Cricket Club buildings have been targeted and the field gate has been damaged several times by would-be thieves. To date, bizarrely, nothing of value has been stolen but the cost in terms of repairs and reinstatement is becoming significant. The Parish Council and the Playing Field Management Committee have therefore decided to restrict vehicular access to the field and village hall car park out of hours by installing a lockable barrier at the entrance. It is hoped that by preventing access at night, attempted break-ins using vehicles will be discouraged. We can all play our part in protecting the assets of the village and I would encourage anybody visiting the field to keep their eyes and ears open for anything unusual or suspicious and report it promptly to the police on 101, at huntonwatch@gmail.com or Huntonwatch - 820403. Please be aware of vehicles in and around the car park and village hall very late at night, lights on the field, unexpected loud noises and, during the day, evidence of attacks on gates, fences and buildings or simply things just not looking quite right – open windows, swinging doors, broken glass and the like.

# **Calor Rural Community Fund**

Calor have donated upwards of £50,000 over the past two years supporting rural communities with generous awards for projects in villages that have little of no main gas. For 2019 there were 35 projects with only five £1000 awards available.

This year we were quick off the mark and bid for £1000 towards a new cooker for the village hall. Preparing the application criteria was a challenge but we did it and then persuaded as many people as possible to vote for the project in a short space of time. The more votes, the better chance we had. Much nagging, cajoling and posts on Village Facebook etc. resulted in votes from 130 people. Meanwhile, through Calor and Crowdfunding we raised £100 from 10 people and became one of the first 20 projects to do so ensuring Calor would automatically double our money. We succeeded quickly and gained another £200. However, a great community spirit kicked in raising a total of £530. Wow!

Fingers were crossed in July for the announcements of the final winners – we won and were awarded £1,000 to add to our £530.

Thank you to everyone who helped by voting or donating to the crowdfunding challenge. It just proves that when our village gets together, things can be achieved.

# **Road Safety Update**

The parish council's Traffic and Road Safety Working Party (TRSWP) has been discussing with KCC the possibility of reducing the speed limit in East Street from the current national speed limit to 30 or 40mph. KCC has not so far been supportive but has agreed to consider it further following a traffic speed survey. The parish council is arranging for this to be carried out by deploying a number of automatic speed monitoring devices (the kind where there are two black cables across the road surface) for a period of a week at various points along East Street during late September or October.

Following a site meeting between Cllr Jonny Goddard and representatives from Kent Highways KCC has agreed to install pedestrian warning signs on Hunton Hill on either side of the Greensand Way. This is something the TRSWP has been lobbying for some time. They have also agreed to install warning signage on the approach to the Elm Corner bend on Redwall Lane. These two items will be funded by KCC.

#### Tree Health Update – New Alert

I've written previously about Ash Die-Back (chalara), which has spread rapidly through the UK. We've also lost horse chestnut trees through bleeding canker and of course Dutch Elm disease. Although the ancient elm hedge on the footpath between the Church and East Street is still regrowing. As long as you keep them cut at shoulder height, the infecting beetles do not tend to land on them. There is now an urgent warning from the Government to be aware of Oak Processionary Moth (OPM) being



found in isolated pockets of the UK, including London. The caterpillars of the moths form large lines processing around the trunks of a tree (hence the name). These characteristically hairy caterpillars feed on oak leaves and can increase trees vulnerability to attack by other pests and diseases making trees less able to withstand weather conditions such as drought and floods.

If you know of anyone who has recently planted any larger oaks imported from the continent, DEFRA is requesting that they check these trees for OPM and report any findings. At this time of year you are most likely to notice the hairy-looking caterpillars or weblike nests - please do not touch either as they could potentially be harmful to your health. For more information on the moth identification and other diseases visit www.observatree.org.uk or www.forestresearch.gov.uk/tools-and-resources. Like the earlier tree diseases, it is the importation of trees and saplings from European nurseries for housing/road development planting that tends to bring these pests to our island, although some can cross the Channel on the wind or traffic tyres. This is a modern day disease but for pretty and highly invasive weeds, like Giant Hogweed, Himalayan Balsam and Japanese Knotweed, we can pin the blame on our Victorian gardeners importing specimens from afar.
