Bake-off or Brexit?

I'm not a great fan of 'reality TV', however I do watch 'The Great British Bake-off'.

'Bake-off' appeals not just for the range of cake-related items which are produced, but for the way the protagonists interact with each other - Paul and Prue act as the parent figures - giving instructions, setting the rules and the standards, giving feedback both positive and negative when needed - Sandi and Noel play the big brother and sister, who may in turn encourage the contestants or tempt them into 'misbehaving'. Contestants are drawn from diverse walks of life but share an enthusiasm for baking. Although as individuals they are keen to do well, gain the weekly 'star baker' accolade, and win the overall competition, they demonstrate remarkable mutual support and encouragement - this may be in practical ways – helping out with some last-minute decoration or lending a utensil; or by expressing empathetic care - with a consoling hug or reassuring words when some culinary disaster strikes.

Whenever a contestant is eliminated, the rest of the group seem as sad that they are leaving as the individual whose baking hadn't quite made the grade that week. The departing baker always speaks of how hard it is to leave because of the sense of belonging, the mutual encouragement, and the fun they have had. At the end of each series, the winner is announced at a party where all the other contestants, and their families, join together to celebrate their success.

We know that 'reality' shows are to a greater or lesser extent contrived for the sake of entertainment and to create the 'feel-good factor' In contrast, the factual reality of our current political situation, due to the behaviour and attitudes of government and parliament who are tasked with the responsibility for the common good of all people, is sadly deficient. In these uncertain times, we need to work at discerning reality and truth, and demonstrating upbuilding and commendable behaviour in all we do.

St. Paul wrote to the Christians in Philippi: 'Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others,' and 'whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things.'

And I'm still waiting for Prue and Paul to set the challenge of making a 'Bible cake'.

Hunton Village Club

It's now been more than a decade since the Club bar has been run by volunteers. Over that time the number of volunteers hasn't dwindled but people tend to volunteer once a month.

The passing years have seen the Club change and become a valuable village asset. Used by several village societies: the Darts teams, Bowls Club, WI, Book Group, Needles & Natter, Panto and Musicals on the Green Rehearsals, including the Playing Fields Committee amongst others. The club is open four evenings a week for general use including special entertainment evenings which include; wine tastings, quiz nights, private hire functions such as birthday, engagement and



anniversary parties. These events all need to continue in order to make the club viable. The venue is also used for daytime activities such as lunches on some Thursdays and after the village walks, the Beer and Gin Festival, Yoga and Pilates sessions and Christening Celebrations. We now even have Sunday lunches on offer!

However, in order to stay open and offer these events the club needs more volunteers to operate the bar. It's not an onerous task and full training will be given. The reduced number of volunteers has meant that it cannot open every day as it used to - sessions are now down to Sunday lunchtimes, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Sunday evenings. The fourth annual beer festival at the Village Club attracted about 150 people who supped 7 cask ales including those from Musket, Westerham, Tonbridge and Goachers breweries. In addition, a gin shack provided a range of cocktails for the non-beer drinkers. The sunny day gave a welcome opportunity to dance outside to the Boughton Ceilidh Band, followed by a local rock group, Clueless, who played a well received session. The BBQ provided further sustenance and children were catered for with face painting, games & making their own Mocktails - the Club would like to thank all those volunteers who helped set up the event, served food and drink and cleared up afterwards as well as everyone who attended. Thanks to kind donations, the costs of this event were minimal and the proceeds amounted to £1,000 which will contribute to various Club improvements, including an upgrade to the toilets.

WI Enjoy A Wine Tasting Evening

The speaker at the WI September Meeting Graham Ashlin gave a superb wine appreciation talk where WI members learnt all about grape varieties and enjoyed sampling their produce. Graham who lives in the village and is well known for his fund raising wine tasting evenings, provided generous donations of fine wines.

Graham started with Chablis which is produced from the Chardonnay grape variety - this is a white wine on the lighter scale of wines - next was an oaked Chardonnay, being in contrast to the light Chablis. The third wine was a Sauvignon Blanc, which proved a favourite with a few ladies but too sharp for some.

The evening moved on to reds, starting with a light red, a pinot noir, followed by a heavier Merlot, finishing with the third red, a Shiraz.

Graham advised that due to the tax, shipping, growers costs and supermarket profits we were better buying a wine of £8 from the supermarket than £5 as we were only buying 40p worth of wine in the cheaper bottle. The members learnt that the American market favoured a heavier glass bottle and the Argentinians produce wine for them in different bottles than the rest of the world - we also learnt the dimple at the bottom of a bottle allows for sediment to settle. Thanks to Graham the members enjoyed learning more about wines and the various methods and places of production. WI meetings are held at the Village Club on the first Tuesday of each month, doors open at 7pm for a 7.30pm start. New ladies are very welcome. Our October speaker is Charles Neve and the subject is Rudyard Kipling.
