# **Call For Sites**

A number of residents attended a consultation on Saturday at the Village Club. At this Parish Councillors explained that two sites in Hunton had been offered for development for the Maidstone Borough Plan: Durrants Farm for 80 houses and land on Heath Road for housing or a caravan site at the top of Hunton Hill (most of this site is in West Farleigh Parish).

MBC has been offered sites for 60000 houses of which the requirement is about 8000. The next stage is for MBC to review which sites it requires to fulfil the perceived need for housing. MBC will use a set of criteria to ascertain, for instance, sustainability and environmental issues.

Parish councillors will be meeting a planning officer from MBC at the end of January to ascertain what criteria will be used and how this will affect the sites offered in Hunton.

#### In the Eye of the Storm

It was a few years ago when we were in the barn, worrying over Lucky the sow and her 2 day old piglets. Something wasn't quite right, Lucky seemed to want to be outside abandoning her very young litter and they weren't scampering around as they should. It all felt wrong.

Suddenly the sky turned black (though it was still only late afternoon) and we found ourselves in the eye of a mini tornado. It was terrifying. We could hear and see the roof of the barn being torn above us. In a few minutes it was all over and there was complete calm: Bishops Lane's power cable was wrenched from its pole and our barn roof was 70 meters away in the field behind us.

We realised that Lucky had sensed something which we had no idea was coming and it spelt disaster for her litter, especially as we hadn't realised her milk had stopped and with it all maternal instinct for her piglets. It is nigh on impossible to rear such young piglets; they feed as much as every half an hour or more



in the first few days and Lucky abandoning them and treading on them was horrendous to watch. We rescued what we could, trying to keep them warm, but it was difficult to feed them and keep them alive.

One survived who we named 'Piglet'. She was really hard work for a couple of days and nights. She was in a box in our conservatory with a heat lamp and with us up most of the next few nights, as we struggled to get her to take any milk from the bottle. I ended up wearing most of the sweet sticky pig formula and wondered how she could be surviving on so little. Eventually I gave up with the bottle and she learned to take milk from a bowl, lapping it up like a cat and pummeling my hand, as she would have done on mum to help bring the milk down. Once we got the hang of it she progressed to the chicken house out on the patio, until we bought a little saddleback boy pig we called 'Hoglet' to keep her company and moved her into the barn. He was already weaned, and we needed him to show her how to eat hard food. She had no concept at all that what I kept trying to thrust at her was food.

Piglet and Hoglet seemed so tiny in those early days scampering in the spacious farrowing pen. They became firm friends. Even as Piglet got bigger, she always rubbed her nose on the trough before having a drink.

# Snowdrops – the start of spring!

Snowdrops traditionally herald the coming of spring and end of winter. They have been seen as a symbol of purity and hope for a very long time. There are more than 2,500 varieties of snowdrop which vary in height from 7cm to 30cm and are divided into approximately 20 species.

The snowdrop's Greek name is 'Galanthus', which translates as 'milk flower'. It has been known over the years by several different names and was officially named the Galanthus in 1753 by the Swedish botanist Carl Linnaeus. Snowdrops became fashionable in the Victorian era but, due to it being known under several different names, no one knows for sure, when they were first introduced to the UK. For many Victorians however a single snowdrop signified death and they considered it bad luck to bring one into the home which could be, in part, due to the bulb of a snowdrop being highly poisonous if eaten.

The first records of plants in the wild date from 1778 – but botanist John Gerard is said to have described the snowdrop in his writings from 1597.

Snowdrops are one of the first flowers to appear in the New Year and, in the northern hemisphere, can be seen appearing as early as January. They usually flower between the months of January and April.

The snowdrop flower has several meanings; the most common are: Purity, Hope, Rebirth, Consolation or Sympathy.

Hans Christian Andersen wrote a story, entitled 'The Snowdrop', based on the fate of a snowdrop and in a poem of the same name, poet Walter de la Mare likened the flower to the Holy Trinity; he also used the snowdrop illustration throughout his poetry.

We are lucky in Hunton to have two snowdrops named for our village (the Hunton Herald and the Hunton Giant). These appear with a variety of other snowdrops in our churchyard and in various gardens and fields; may they all mean a rapid onset of spring!

No snowdrop yet its small head nods, In winds of winter drear; No lark at casement in the sky Sings matins shrill and clear; Yet in this frozen mirk the Dawn Breathes, Spring is here!

#### **Garden Jobs this month**

Start 'chitting' early potatoes in a light frost-free place, like a conservatory.

Cover rhubarb plants if you want early tender stems with a large plant pot or forcing pot.

Plant bare root trees, hedging plants and fruit bushes.

Start some early seed sowing, particularly hardy annuals such as sweet peas and vegetables like peas and Salads if growing them under cover

#### Perhaps more fitting...Rainy day jobs for the garden

Sort out old seed packets and get organized with the seeds you want to sow this year. Make a point of keeping them in the fridge in an airtight container such as a tin or old ice cream carton, to increase their longevity.

Browse the catalogues and order plants and seeds

Clean up gardening tools, the greenhouse and potting sheds. Get tools sharpened. If you have an expensive pair of secateurs it is well worth getting them serviced. Burton McCall (01162 344 646) will service felco secatuers for £25.00 per pair which includes return postage, any replacement nuts, bolts, springs, handles, blades, etc. and VAT. Pretty good value as they come back like new!

#### Why Renew Your Village Club Membership?

The new Club year commenced on 1<sup>st</sup> January, which means the membership renewal subscription, (£15 if paid before the end of February) is now due.

The Club holds a 'Premises Licence', which allows for the sale of alcohol to Club members for consumption by the member and guests. It is not like a pub licence where there is an individual named licensee who is allowed to sell alcohol to the public during regulated licencing hours. So we have to operate as a Members' Club, at least in so far as the sale of alcohol is concerned. Other activities have no such restrictions or membership requirements. People have asked what benefits a membership brings save for being allowed to purchase a drink? First thoughts bring little else to mind. A member may hire the club for a private function (assuming there are volunteers available) at a comparatively competitive low cost to some other venues. We have already held a christening party this year for more than 50 invitees. The Club's bar prices are also below that of other local establishments.

However, the real benefit is to the community as a whole. The combined total of the membership subscriptions is a reasonable sum, which goes toward maintaining the Club for the benefit of the Village community. So please do renew your subscription or join the Club so that we can continue to help maintain this important village asset.
