Bless You!

I've been suffering with a virus/cold/chesty cough for a few weeks now. When it first kicked off, I was walking out of church and I sneezed very loudly. "Bless you" said Barry. Then "where does that expression come from?" It's a good question isn't it? I am fascinated by the origins of sayings. That particular one – a contraction of "God bless you!" - has two possible answers. One is that sneezing is expelling some kind of demon, and the second – more likely – is that Pope Gregory suggested a quick prayer for those who sneezed during the bubonic plague in Rome, in the belief that God's blessing would ward off the source of the infection. There are many others in a similar vein. Strewth! is a contraction of "Ain't that God's truth!" often used as an expression of surprise. Blimey is another expression of surprise and stems from another contraction: "God blind me!" Even worse (depending on your perspective) is the contraction of "Christ kill me!" into Crikey! Gadzooks (not often heard in my circle of acquaintances) comes from "God's hooks" – a reference to the nails of crucifixion on the cross. Many of these expressions develop as a way of minimising the effect of an unplanned expression of exasperation, for example "flipping heck" having the same initials as another, rather more unsavoury expression.

Calling upon God (or the Lord) is a well-known activity in the historic faith of the church, and there are over 60 Bible verses which directly reference it. The calling upon the Lord has several purposes or effects. Abraham called upon the Lord in praise and worship, giving God his rightful place. The Psalmists do likewise and also call upon God in thanksgiving. The Bible tells us that those who call upon the Lord will be saved from their sins. Mostly, their calling upon the Lord is at times of stress or distress. How true that is for us today, too. Maybe instead of using an expletive in our moments of difficulty we might do as King David did. Psalm 18:6 tells us "In my distress I called upon the LORD, And cried to my God for help; He heard my voice out of His temple, And my cry for help before Him came into His ears" and in doing so honour the name of God, and seek his help during our times of trouble.

Wendy Sharp's Accidental Smallholding

At the WI meeting in February our speaker was Hunton resident, Wendy Sharp. Her family moved to Hunton in 2002 when they were simply looking for a property to accommodate the children's 2 ponies; a smallholding was definitely not a requirement, but things change! Wendy's talk was illustrated throughout by beautifully evocative photos.

At the age of 6, a family holiday on a Hill Farm in Wales triggered Wendy's love of animals and the countryside. After Agricultural College, she worked on a number of farms in the UK and USA, learning new skills such as confidently reversing a very large tractor and trailer. However the demands of a growing family put agriculture on hold until the ponies needed a new home. Hence they moved to their present home in Hunton but the burning became "what to do with 4 acres in an Area Of Natural Beauty?"

Now there are 5 peacocks (7 before the fox visited) including 1 unusual white one; ex-caged hens; 6 geese that prove to be better guard dogs than the actual dog; turkeys and guinea fowl all wandering freely around the stable yard and sometimes the garden.

Wendy has taken a keen interest in preserving rare breeds with a pedigree breeding saddleback sow and piglets of various ages, with a liking for apples and avocados – which must give the meat an interesting flavour! As well as some commercial white sheep and a small flock of Jacob's sheep, (another rare breed, kept for their meat, fleece and skins). The ram, Daily Dave, is particularly handsome and not at all camera-shy.

Another accidental development was acquiring a German Shepherd dog after a burglary. This led to Wendy breeding pedigree German Shepherds so successfully that she is now a Kennel Club Assured Breeder with Janet winning a place at Crufts 2 years running. Janet; in addition to Crufts, has her gold dog training certificate and regularly visits schools, hospitals and care homes as a qualified Therapy Dog. She did not appear to be overly interested by Wendy's fascinating talk, preferring to have a nap for most of the evening! However, the rest of us were impressed with Wendy's enthusiasm and boundless energy in managing such a varied and diverse way of life.

It just goes to show what an amazing range of people we have living in our village.

Timber!

Those who walk past the Church may notice that a fir tree, which has been growing on the East side for over 100 years, has now been taken down. Rather overgrown (about 100ft high), and too close to the building and windows, its roots were a structural damage threat. DAC approval was obtained following the display of the required public notice.

Hunton Arborists won the tender stating "it was one of the most difficult jobs they had undertaken in their 7 years of trading" George Sharp assured us this was due to the limited drop zone caused by the close proximity of listed table top tombs, a listed church with a large number of tombstones rather than the quality of the enthusiastic volunteer workforce! Happily, George managed to avoid damaging anything (or anyone).

Just when we thought the job was over the tree did its best to make life difficult for us. The photo shows how, rather than falling to the ground as expected, it rocked onto a wedge shaped cut and stuck there – we couldn't have planned it if we had tried!

Rather than grind the stump out, as was originally planned, we have decided to turn it into a simple seat (or bench for 3 slim people) and as such it is a welcome addition to the churchyard. We also wanted to avoid damaging a listed table top tomb - a corner of which had been lifted by the tree's root system. In closing, we are sorry to report that Hunton Arborists are no longer operating.



Litter Picking Group Disbanded

It is with great regret that we must say a final thank you to Di Martin, her group of volunteers and to MBC, for the 10 years or so of their organised and supported litter-picking group. Di has done a wonderful job and her infectious enthusiasm and energy has helped to keep our village cleaner than would otherwise have been possible!

Going forward, MBC has withdrawn all meaningful support as they have concluded that they cannot be connected with any litter picking activity carried out on roads that do not have 30mph limits or on any road with no pavement. MBC has explained that this decision is driven by their concern for our own safety, as well as legislative and insurance cover constraints.

MBC will continue to collect fly tipped waste on public roads or verges (contact 01622 602600) but, for more everyday needs, we have to rely on the services of a road-sweeping vehicle (which we have now seen operating in the village). Whilst this collects rubbish from the roads it sweeps, it will not clean litter from the verges, ditches or hedgerows. MBC will not send out their street cleaning team to hand pick such litter unless KCC Highways have a scheduled road closure, nor will they accept any help from volunteers while such road closure and cleaning operation is ongoing.

MBC has stated that anyone collecting rubbish from the roads and putting it in bins (even if they are their own) is perhaps liable to prosecution for fly-tipping as the litter collection service is for household rubbish alone. Whilst any such prosecution would be unlikely, any organised litter pick would perhaps just raise the profile of this activity and make a reaction from MBC more likely.

It seems that until a better outcome can be found we either have to accept the rubbish that litters our streets or quietly and individually take whatever action we think is best to fill the gap. We will continue to try and better understand, and if appropriate challenge, MBC's interpretation of current rules, also work with the Parish Council and our local Borough Councillors to see if they can suggest an acceptable and practicable way forward.

What Happens to our Advertising Revenue?

After 5 years managing and developing the advertising for The Hunton Herald, Sue Pinks has decided to step down.

We would like to thank her for her enormous contribution and to say that she has left big shoes to fill so she will be greatly missed. Over its 17 years of operation the Herald has distributed over £15,000 to village causes with the four largest recipients being the School, the Friends of St Mary's, the Club and the Village Hall who together account for 80% of funds distributed. We currently have an undistributed surplus of about £6,000 (although this will fall after a contribution to the renewal of the Village Hall kitchen project). There are projects which we are aware of that might lead to requests for funding support from the Club for an upgrade to its lavatories and from the Church, for a contribution towards the cost of installing a compost loo.
